
But her heart is breaking with theirs, and she wonders if this Army life is worth the sacrifice.

The Supercooks Column

On the Provencal market place it is still called "La Pomme d'Amour": a very pretty way of referring to the tomato. It is a vegetable of so many qualities: low in calories yet high in vitamin C, can be eaten hot or cold, in salads or in sauces, as am hors d'oeuvre or a soup, a main course or simply as a vegetable. You can even turn it into jams or chutneys.

So this month, here are a few suggestions with tomatoes: first a typical Basque country dish "La Piperade", then ideas for hot and cold stuffed tomatoes and finally, a tomato and olive tart.

PIPERADE

A light and delicious dish of eggs blended with tomatoes, peppers and ham.

(For 4 people)

150 gms (6 ozs) smoked ham, diced

200 gms (8 ozs) red and green peppers, diced

1.5 kg (3lbs) tomatoes, skinned and seeded

3 tablespoons unsalted butter

2 tablespoons oil

salt and freshly milled black pepper

Soften the ham and the peppers for 5-6 minutes in the oil and butter in a large frying pan. Add the tomatoes, salt and pepper and continue cooking.

Beat the egg whites until stiff. Mix the egg yolks and add to the cooked vegetable mixture. Stir quickly with a wooden spoon over a moderate heat until it thickens and is well blended with a foamy consistency.

Serve with a dry white wine.

COLD STUFFED TOMATOES

- With chopped tongue, chopped gherkins, 1 chopped hard boiled egg, 6 tablespoons of chives and a mustard vinaigrette.
- Liquidise 6 sardines and two hard boiled egg yolks, add a teaspoon of mustard, juice of half a lemon, a tablespoon of cream and chopped parsley.
- Boursin or Philadelphia cheese, 1 slice of finely chopped ham, 1 tablespoon of chopped nuts and one tablespoon of cream.

HOT STUFFED TOMATOES

- $-\,$ Mix left-over white chicken meat, diced red pepper, $^{1}/_{2}$ cup of thick Bechamel, 3 tablespoons of double cream, 1 teaspoon of Port.
- Cook 2 onions, finely chopped, in butter, add them to
 1 cup of cooked rice, 1 slice of chopped ham (not too lean if possible)
 25 gms (1 oz) of chopped pistachio nuts, 1 tablespoon of raisins and enough chicken stock to keep the stuffing moist.
- Cook 100 gms (4 ozs) mushrooms in butter, add them to some cooked white fish, some of the tomato pulp, ¹/₂ a cup of Bechamel and cover with 50 gms (2 ozs) grated gruyere cheese.

TARTE A LA TOMATO AT AUX OLIVES

(for 6 people)
250 gms (10 ozs) short crust pastry
1.5 kg (3 lbs) tomatoes
250 gms (10 ozs) ham
2 eggs
100 gms (4 ozs) black olives
2 garlic cloves
1 large onion
2 tablespoons olive oil
salt, pepper, oregano, rosemary.

Line a flan tin with the pastry, prick the surface with a fork, cover with a piece of grease-proof paper, fill with dried beans and bake blind for 20 minutes/25minutes in a hot oven. Meanwhile, peel tomatoes, onion and garlic. Seed the tomatoes. Finely chop the onion and then cook gently until golden in the oil. Add the tomatoes, the garlic cloves, the rosemary and the oregano. Season with salt and pepper. Cook slowly without a lid for 15 to 20 minutes. Chop the ham. put it on the cooked pastry base. Take the garlic cloves out of the tomato mixture and add the beaten eggs. Pour on to the tart base and decorate with black olives on top.

Put back in the oven for about 10 minutes or until cooked. Suggested serving, with a Rose de Provence wine.

Notes from the Supply Flight

It will come as no surprise to readers that the disruption of transport in January within UK and the recent and continuing industrial action by some Civil Servants have had a detrimental effect on receipts of accommodation stores for married quarters, particularly in respect of carpets and furniture. Once stopped it is difficult for us to get into top gear again but it is hoped that intensive efforts when the troubles are over will return us to a 'normal' supply situation.

Curtains, although manufactured in Germany (15 COD Viersen to be precise) have also been subjected to some delay lately. All those involved hope to reduce the present average waiting time of five months. In all fairness, it is probably true to say that the curtains being replaced in married quarters usually have quite a few weeks "life" left in them, even if there is a fear that the next wash/dry clean might see their disintegration! Usually, this suspicion is unjustified, they are stronger than they look, and it behoves us to get the maximum wear out of our curtains, as indeed we should from all soft furnishings in the interests of economy.

A suggestion that soldiers' and airmen's married quarters should be issued with garden trowels was received at a recent wives' club briefing and was passed on to higher authority for their consideration. We believe that reaction could be favourable, given that officers' quarters are already scaled for this relatively inexpensive but highly useful item.

Many upholstery covers of the new plainer coloured "MODEC" range have unfortunately had to be rejected due to production faults with incorrect zip fasteners and seams, however, new supplies should be trickling in by mid-Summer replacing the present thinner "camouflage" range as they eventually wear out. "MODEC" covers are being introduced only on a maintenance basis, when the older type are well and truly finished so please bear with these for the time being. Experiments are continuing with other materials to replace the unpopular white calico undercovering of upholstered furniture so that it is a little more attractive to look at when the loose covers are removed for cleaning and a good deal more practical to live with.

Gaining access to married quarters is often a problem and we would ask occupants to leave their telephone number with our Barrack Stores Control Office (Rheindahlen Ext 4742). If you cannot be at home to receive/return stores it would be appreciated if a key could be left with a neighbour and if you could tell us you have done so. Believe it or not, continued failure to gain access has often delayed the issue of new carpets and furniture until eventual "march out". All right for the new occupants but a storage and transportation problem in the meanwhile for the Supply Flight!

Let's go to the pictures

Nan Biles' selection of films showing during May at both cinemas.

Gene Hackman stars in "The Domino Killings" (Astra 9, 10), the story of a man who has been in and out of jail since childhood, and now doing a twenty-year sentence for killing his ex-boss. When a stranger visits him and promises freedom in return for a simple 'job' Tucker agrees. He is 'sprung' and set up in a beautiful villa, with a large bank account and a surprise visitor, his boss's wife Ellie (Candice Bergen). To assassinate a national figure is the price of freedom, and then Ellie is murdered...

The talented actor-director Mel Brooks invades the territory of Hitchcock thrillers with his usual hilarious results, in "High Anxiety" (Astra 27, 28). Professor Thorndyke arrives to take over the Institute for the Very, Very Nervous, an odd assignment in view of this own terrifying fear of heights. He becomes a threat to the head nurse and assistant director who are keeping healthy people in hospital while bleeding their families of their fortunes. After several Hitchcockian situations the film races to a wildly funny climax as the Professor conquers his high anxiety on top of the Institute's tower.

Goldie Hawn, who may be remembered as "Laugh-In's" dizzy blonde, stars in "Foul Play" (Globe 11, 12). She plays a San Francisco librarian who is propelled into a world of international crime and intrigue, and who while escaping a thousand deaths falls in love with a handsome police inspector (Chevy Chase). A plot to murder the Pope during a visit to "The Mikado" is at the centre of this amusing, inventive film. Also in the cast are Dudley Moore as an orchestral conductor with an unusual line in furniture in his apartment, and Rachel Roberts as a karate-chopping villainess.

Sean Connery dons a stovepipe hat as a Victorian thief in "The First Great Train Robbery" (Globe 18, 19), based on a true story about a theft of gold bullion from a London-Folkestone train. The action includes a public hanging at Newgate Jail, fireworks at the Crystal Palace and an exciting climax atop the speeding steam train. Thief Connery's decoy is played by Lesley-Anne Down of TV's "Upstairs, Downstairs".

Robert Powell is the latest in the line of distinguished actors to play Richard Hannay in "The Thirty-Nine Steps" (Globe 24, 25, 26), in a well-made, well-acted version of John Buchan's famous book.

RHEINDAHLEN PUPILS ON GERMAN RADIO

Information suppled by Mr. J H N Lovegrove Headmaster, Queen's School.

In the Summer of 1975 Frau Doktor Verderber of West Deutscher Rundfunk approached Queen's School, Rheindahlen, with a problem she was having in finding suitable voices for her radio programmes. Frau Verderber is responsible for producing English language programmes for schools and in particular the two series "English for Juniors" and "English for Seniors". Apparently there was no shortage of adults to play the various members of the "Cannon Family" but no suitable children. With the agreement of HQ BFES programme producers came to Queen's School and auditioned the several young hopefuls who had shown a great interest in the opportunity. Tape recordings were made and two pupils, Simon King and Philomena Ryan, chosen.

Recordings for the programmes commenced in October 1975 in the WDR studios in Cologne, and the series was used for the first time in the Summer of 1976 and found to be successful and popular.

The recording sessions in Cologne have proved fascinating, opportunities always being afforded to the pupils and their parents to look around the studios and have equipment explained, especially the sound effects and how they are obtained.

During recent weeks three visits have been made to the Cologne studios, the children on the first occasion being Christopher Bradley, Nick Armitage and Sarah Gardner. On the second visit Leigh Clarke, Judith Reeves and Nigel Harvey were chosen, and the third and final session the selected pupils were Christopher Bradley, George Chalmers and Christopher May.

The Birds in your Garden

Don't feed the birds! This is the time of year when kindness can kill birds. The natural food of the Tit family, for example, is small caterpillars and the baby birds just cannot digest peanuts and coconut. Young birds, like human babies, need natural food in their infancy, so please ease up on the bird feeding until late summer. However, when, or if, the weather gets hot, a bird-bath or any shallow container of water will be much appreciated by the birds. A word about 'rescuing' baby birds — don't! That seemingly helpless fledgling almost certainly has a parent waiting for you to go away so that it can feed its baby. In any event natural selection should be allowed to take place. If all the blackbirds that hatched on the Garrison survived we would be knee-deep in them in a few years!



Common in the undergrowth of woods and in parks and larger gardens from April onwards, the Nightingale is like an all-brown Robin with a conspiciously rusty-coloured tail. This is often all that can be seen of this usually furtive bird as it dives for the nearest cover. Its song is very loud and musical, with a large range of notes, and it is the only bird around the

Garrison that sings at night(sometimes all night, sometimes every night, as those who are blessed/cursed with one will tell you!)

The Redstart is also common in parks, gardens and open deciduous and mixed woodland and can be seen on the Garrison from April until October. The male is unmistakable with a white forehead, black throat and a grey back contrasting with a bright



chestnut tail and underparts while the female is dull, grey brown above and buff-coloured below. It is an active bird and often catches insects on the wing, 'flycatcher fashion' — short forays from a favourite perch. Its song is a short melodious Robin-like warble ending in a short twitter.

Spring is sprung, the grass is riz, I wonder where my fanbelt is... so go the inspired words of the bard, — I think! Well, it should be spring at least, by the time you read this and I think the fanbelt and one or two more rubbery items are worth a mention in this column at this time of year. It was a miserably long and cold winter and the bits of your car that suffered most during the freeze are probably all the rubber items. I'm sure we will have cheeked our cars or had them serviced after the winter but we usually give the rubber parts little more than a cursory glance, as do not appear in their schedules.

Let's do a check of the more important parts before taking long summer drives, starting with the aforementioned belt or belts! Are they all there? Not tatty, frayed, slack or too tight. How about the water hoses? Not hardened, perished, split, oily or chafing against any metal part. The last part of your brake lines, just before the road wheel, is a flexible rubber pipe. Are they kinked, tightly bent or perishing? Whilst you are checking those, is there any brake fluid seepage at the wheel cylinders. Rubber seals should

be ensuring that there isn't.

Did you destroy the fine edge on your screen wiper blades when you scraped ice off your windscreen? Are your wipers still efficient? Similarly, did you tear any pieces from your door seals when wrenching at frozen doors! Any damage here will not only let in the rain but harmful exhaust gases too! Astound your neighbours next year by opening the doors perfectly normally, having remembered first to wipe round the seals with a little glycerine before the onset of winter.

Your car's exhaust system will be affixed in part by rubber. Usually in the form of doughnut-type rings or sandwich (metal-rubber-metall) blocks. The ring type are very tough but the block type may not last so long. Always carry spare coolant hoses (and their clips) and a fanbelt and don't forget the basic tools to fit

No, I didn't forget the tyres. I have assumed that we are all totally sensible with regard to these and always make regular and very thorough checks. A few more rubber points to ponder: Steering and suspension joints, couplings, fuel pipes, engine mountings, heater hoses . . .


