



Do You Know About General Insurance?

In the May '86 edition of the Rheindahlen Bulletin I talked about house insurance, house contents insurance, and all risks insurance.

In this article I shall cover 'All Risks' and motor insurance. I must mention at this stage that when I write about different types of Insurance I am of course referring to British Companies rules and regulations and where applicable British law. I had many telephone calls on this matter and I hope this clears up any misunderstanding and generally speaking all British service people and dependants etc. are covered by these rules even when serving abroad.

All-risks Insurance

All-risks insurance provides

cover for personal belongings in the event of loss and in certain cases accidental damage in circumstances where cover would not be provided under the home contents policy. Thus, an allrisks policy (or the all-risks portion of households contents policies) would cover the loss of a diamond ring in the home in circumstances other than the normal perils of theft or fire covered by the contents policy. An all-risks policy would cover personal possessoins while being carried around from place to place or worn on the person, and cover can be taken out for the U.K. only or on a limited geographical basis or on a worldwide basis. Thus, a fur coat may be covered by the ordinary household contents policy if damaged by fire or stolen while in the house, but it would not be covered if stolen from the cloakroom at the police ball unless separate all-risks cover had been taken out. Typical examples of articles for which all-risks cover would be appropriate are jewellery, furs, watches, cameras, binoculars and other valuable items of personal use or ornament. Also, as mentioned above, articles in the home may be covered for damage

not otherwise covered by a

contents policy

The insurer will require all articles above a stated value, e.g. £50, to be listed in the proposal form and in the case of all items above a stated value, e.g. £250, the insurer will normally require a separate certificate of value. Most all-risk policies are now available on a new-for-old basis and, with a large number of companies, the cover can be index linked. Premiums vary considerably depending upon the nature of the articles insured and the geographical extent of the cover. In some cases, the rates will apply only if cover is also taken out with the same company for general contents insurance. The basic level of all-risks premiums among the leading companies varies from £1% in the low cost areas of the U.K. to £3% in central London.

Motor insurance

There are four broad categories of motor insurance:

- insurance under the Road Traffic Act.
- third party insurance,
- third party, fire and theft insurance,
- comprehensive insurance. These are considered in turn.

Road Traffic Act Insurance

This is the minimum insurance required by law before anybody may venture on the public highway with a licensed vehicle. Anyone who takes on a public road a vehicle covered by the Act without the basic insurance required under the Act commits a criminal offence.

Road Traffic Act insurance covers (a) the owner or (b) any person driving the car with the owner's permission (provided they are authorised to do so under the policy) against claims for death or injury to any other persons, including passengers in the car. This basic insurance covers no more than that. It does not, for example, cover damage or injury caused by the driver when driving the car elsewhere than on a public highway. It does not cover any damage to a car or other property belonging to any other person in any circumstances whatever. The risk of taking a car on the road in modern conditions are so great that this basic insurance for the purpose of the Road Traffic Act is quite inadequate and few, if any, insurance companies would encourage drivers to take out this minimum insurance

Third party insurance

This type of cover includes the minimum insurance required under the Act, but provides also for injury to other parties and damage to other people's property.

This type of cover protects the owner and any driver who is driving with the owner's permission within the terms of the policy against any claim by another party, but it does not enable the owner or driver to claim against the insurance company for any injury or damage to himself, his car or his other property.

Third party, fire and theft insurance

This is a combination of the two foregoing categories plus cover for damage or loss occasioned by fire or theft.

Many car owners regard this last category of insurance as sufficient for their purpose.

It does not enable the insured to claim against the insurance company for any damage to the car or its contents as a result of an accident and does not cover loss or damage to the contents of the car as a result of fire or theft.

Comprehensive insurance

This embraces the three categories of insurance stated above, together with cover for the owner in the event of damage to his car and damage to or loss of any of the contents. The extent of the cover will depend in each case on the wording of the policy but, in the case of the contents of the car, would not normally extend to items carried in the course of business. These should therefore be separately covered. Variations in cover

Although the aforementioned four categories of motor insurance are common to all insurers, there is a degree of variation in the extent of cover which they provide in each category. The following are the principal areas of difference:

- Some companies will not insure

 Some companies will not insure drivers under the age of 25 years for driving highpowered cars.
 The cover for theft may be

 The cover for theft may be restricted if the car is not kept in a locked garage.

 Most insurers will not cover anyone driving a car for business purposes other than the insured person named in or covered by the policy.

 Many companies will not cover the contents of a car above a stipulated figure.

 Money and jewellery will not normally be covered if lost from a motor car.

No claims discount

The premium discount allowed by insurers in the event of there being no claim over a given period (colloquially referred to as a no claims bonus) may be lost if the insurer is called upon to make any contribution to a particular claim, notwithstanding that the insured may not have been in any way responsible for the loss or damage. This may arise, for example, where the person causing the loss or damage is not known, e.g. another driver who did not stop.

The same situation may arise where the insurer has a so-called 'knock for knock' agreement with the other party's insurer. Such an agreement, under which each insurance company pays for the

damage incurred by its own insured party regardless of blame, can result in the loss to an innocent party of a no claims discount. This can be avoided by (a) taking out a policy which some companies offer whereby a no claims discount can be preserved on payment of a higher basic permium, but even here there is usually a limit on the number of claims which may be made without the loss of a discount, or (b) getting the other party and/or their insurers to admit liability and meet the whole of the claim. Any insured person who does not wish to lose his no claims discount may in any case commence proceedings against any party whom he considers to be to blame for the accident. Such proceedings may be somewhat drawn out but, if successful, the other party and/or his insurers will pay the damages. Certificate of insurance

No vehicle may lawfully be driven on the road unless the driver is in possession of a valid certificate of insurance. A 'cover note' issued by the insurer pending the issue of the certificate of insurance will serve as a temporary certificate for the period named in the cover note. The possession of a motor car policy does not of itself authorise the insured to take a vehicle on the road. The certificate of insurance will indicate who is covered by the policy in question, e.g. the owner and one named driver.


The possession of a valid certificate of insurance will cover a driver while driving someone else's car (if this is within the terms of the policy, as would normally be the case), but such cover only extends to that required under the Road Traffic Act plus third party cover. It does not cover the driver for any damage done to the car he is driving. Insurance against loss of

licence or incapacity

At least one insurance company (New Hampshire Insurance Company of the U.S.A.) provides cover for drivers in the event of disqualification, whether because of a series of endorsements or because of a breathalyser test and incapacity to drive occasioned by injury. 





to the community.



Discovering herbs and spices



As part of our project on the Middle Ages the children of J.4. and Mr Hepworth, our teacher, have been looking at the food they ate and in particular the way in which it was flavoured or preserved. The peasant girls would cook all the meal and do all the

household chores. The demand for spices came when the noble families had meat on the menu. The meat had been preserved in salty water and it must have been disgusting so they disguised the awful taste with spices. The peasants used herbs because they couldn't afford spices. To see if we could taste the difference Liz, Cheryl, Glynn and Michael made some Spicy Biscuits, they used Nutmeg, Cinnamon, Ground Ginger and Whole Ginger (to compare them). Everyone had a taste and after a poll was taken to see which flavour was best, the Ground Ginger won. Mrs Heavey from Kent School came to show us how to preserve meat, this is how it was done.

How to salt meat - for one chop

First place two tablespoons of salt on a plate and next add a teaspoon of Salt Peter. Then score the meat on both sides and rub the meat into the salt mixture. Then in a jug or bowl pour in about six centimetres of water and add a spoonful of treacle, onion seeds, bay leaves, black pepper corns and fennel. Once the meat is in the water weight it under with a lid. In six weeks we are going to open it to see what it is like!!!





POLICESMAN'S

Crime Prevention

Burglaries of Married Quarters are, regrettably, common occurrences in BAOR. The purpose of these notes is to assist families in taking precautions against such incidents and to make them aware of the present threat of the common thief.

Families should be aware that the most likely target is an empty or unoccupied MQ and that there are very few occasions, when occupants are likely to come into contact with the thief.

There are three main methods of stealing from houses:

Sneak stealing - This usually occurs during your working day, e.g. while you are at the Naafi or in the garden. This is effected by a quick walk up to the door or window by the thief who has a ready made excuse for his presence if he is noticed e.g. trader or potential gardener. This type of offence is prevalent in summer and warm weather.

Unimpeded Entry - Which usually occurs when the house is unoccupied, or at night. Access is gained by insecure windows, cellar flaps, or downstairs toilet windows which are invariably left open.



Breaking and entering -

This is a noisy business usually practised on an empty house, but not always. The back door, windows or coal chute are favourite methods of entry.

What Information do the Police Want?

The exact location of the incident.

A full description and number of people involved.

A description of the scene. Registration numbers and makes of vehicles used.

It's all so simple. Your own Property Keep a note of serial numbers of your valuables. If any are stolen, the police will stand a better chance of recovering them if you can give a full description and details of serial numbers. Don't think: 'It can't happen to me' or 'I've nothing worth taking anyway'. It does happen. The thief is often quite content with the ordinary things:

Television Stereo Equipment
Radio Binoculars

Here are but a few tips that will help protect your valuables. Money

Never keep more money in the house then you require. Keep it in the Bank and keep your cheque book and cheque card in a safe place.




Leave a Light

Don't switch off all the lights when you go out to the SSVC or the Mess. Thieves usually avoid houses with lights on. Keep a light burning in one of the rooms, not in the hall.



Valuables

Don't leave valuables on view to the thief. Close your curtains at night and even when you go out in the evening (and don't forget the light). Don't leave your camera, watches, wallet and silverware etc on the table or sideboard. Put them in a drawer out of sight.



Holidays

When the time of year comes for you to get away for that break, go with peace of mind. Lock your valuables away. Ask a neighbour to keep an eye on your house and to report anything suspicious. Make that extra check in that the house is secure and then inform the RMP.



Security of your MQ

Always lock all exterior doors when leaving the house, even for a short period. Be sure all windows are fastened, including those in the cellar.



Kevs

Don't leave your key inserted in the lock on the outside of the door, even when you are sitting in the house. It only takes seconds to make a wax impression and then you may get unwanted visitors and never know how they got in. Nor should you leave a key under the mat or dust-bin; the thief will find it sooner or later.



Callers

Use a safety chain on the front door when you answer it at night or when you are alone. Always satisfy yourself about the credentials of strangers claiming to be PSA, agents for insurance companies etc., before admitting them. Be warned against the



danger of doing business with callers at the door. Some are genuine, some are not. In BAOR you should never find the need to hand over money in advance to casual callers who carry out repairs and so on. So don't.



Tell the RMP

If you are at all suspicious about prowlers don't hesitate - call the police. Some day you may be thankful someone did the same for you.

By using a little commonsense, taking precautions and being vigilant, you can help reduce crime and catch the criminals. The police need your help in beating the criminal. After all, it's your duty as a citizen.

If you saw someone being attacked you would call the police wouldn't you? So, call them just the same if you see someone lurking around your neighbour's house or trying car doors. The police prefer a false alarm to a burglary or a stolen car.

And ring at once - seconds count



Note: Where you see this sign you must display the blue coloured parking disc.

You must set the time display on arrival and not exceed the time limit displayed on the sign. This is a mandatory requirement by German law and failure to do so may result in a fine.

Places on the Garrison where these are displayed are the Post office (time allow-

ed 1 hour) and the Main Naafi and Oakham Way (time allowed 2 hours).



Veal Escalopes In Mustard Sauce

Unlike the U.K. the local butchers always have a plentiful supply of veal (kalbfleisch), ask for kalbsnitzel when you require escalopes. This recipe is quick and easy to make and goes well with chips and sweetcorn.

Ingredients (serves 4)

4 Veal escalopes, beaten flat 1 garlic clove, halved ½ teaspoon salt ½ teaspoon pepper 60 grms butter 180 grms Gruyère cheese, grated

2 tablespoons French mustard

4 fl ozs double cream

Method

1. Rub the veal with the two halves of garlic then sprinkle with the salt and pepper.

2. In a large frying pan melt the butter and, when the foam subsides, cook the veal escalopes for 3-4 minutes on each side until tender.

Transfer them with a slotted spoon to a flameproof dish large enough to hold them in a single layer.

3. Preheat the grill then place the cheese, mustard and cream in a bowl and beat the mixture with a fork until it is well combined. Spread this mixture evenly over the escalopes.

4. Place under the grill and cook until the cheese is golden brown and bubbling.

Serve at once.

Apple Plait

This is an unusual looking and tasting dessert which is equally nice served hot or cold.

ingredients

30 gms fresh white breadcrumbs
30 gms butter
240 gms puff pastry
500 gms cooking apples,
peeled and sliced
grated rind of a lemon
2 tablespoons sugar
240 gms cottage cheese
120 gms raisins
milk

castar sugar

Method

- 1. Fry the breadcrumbs in the butter until crisp and golden. Leave to cool.
- 2. Roll out the pastry into an

oblong shape and place a narrow column of apples down the centre. Sprinkle the apples with the lemon rind and sugar and then spread the cottage cheese over the apples. Top the cheese with the raisins and breadcrumbs.

3. Fold the top and bottom ends of the pastry over the apple column, slice the sides into ½" strips and fold each alternating ½" strip over the column to cover in a plait pattern of pastry.

4. Brush with milk, sprinkle with caster sugar and cook for 30 minutes in an oven heated to 200°C / 400°F Gas mark 7. Serve hot or cold.



Quick Holiday Meals. Holiday time is not always relaxing for Mothers, children and husbands tend to get twice as hungry, and on a long car or bus journey, eating relieves the boredom. Cook, or buy a cooked chicken before you depart on holiday, and you will find it will make a variety of different meals.



Chicken and peanut butter.

Use the dark flesh from the wings and legs, chop finely, mix with a generous portion of peanut butter and spread on French bread or rolls, tip with lettuce.



Devilled chicken. Blend a pinch of curry powder, a few drops of Worcestershire sauce and cayenne pepper with butter, spread over bread then cover with thin slices of chicken.



Chicken and lemon. Blend finely grated lemon rind and a few drops of lemon juice with butter, spread on bread, then add thin slices of chicken. The very delicate flavour of the lemon adds interest to the sandwich.



Curried chicken and banana open sandwich.

Blend sliced bananas, mayonnaise and a little curry powder with chicken cut in tiny bits. Place a little crisp lettuce on to a rye bread, or crispbread, place a generous portion of chicken mixture on top, garnish with a pineapple ring.



Trinidad chicken. A meal to make before your journey and enjoy in a picnic place off the motorway.

3oz seedless raising 3 tablespoons rum

Pour rum over raisins and leave to soak overnight 6 tablespoons green label chutney

2 tablespoons cream 1 cup mayonnaise chicken (approx. 1.5 kilos) cooked

a little lemon juice salt and pepper to taste 1oz dessicated coconut 2oz salted peanuts 2 large bananas 1 ripe avocado (optional) chopped parsley

Chop the chicken into bite size chunks. Blend mayonnaise, chutney, coconut, peanuts, creams, raising and rum in a large mixing bowl, add the chicken and one of the bananas chopped up in slices. Add salt and pepper. You can leave in the bowl until ready to serve.

To serve. Arrange chicken mixture in a serving dish. Cut the remaining banana and avocado (if used) in thin strips and arrange on top. Squuze a little lemon juice on top to prevent discoloration. Sprinkle chopped parsley on top. Serve with rice or green salad.



All in one breakfast flapjacks. (For two hungry campers, or four normal) Make a batter with 4oz flour and 2ggs mixed with a little milk. Stir 40z of quick porrage oats into the mixture. Drop spoonfuls into hot fat in your frying pan, turn to cook the other side. Serve with honey. Very quick, easy and filling.

- Festival of One Act Plays 1986


Variety was the order of the day when the Ariel Festival was adjudicated by Mr Cliff Overton of Kent School on Saturday, 24th May at the Little Theatre. The three plays presented to a capacity audience were all totally different in style, presentation and content.

The 'Miasma of Mostyn Mews' by Alan Ogden and directed by Alan Boxx was a thought provoking comedy about the ordinary people faced with Town Hall bureaucracy and their attempts to have their complaints and worries listened to and acted upon. Archie Cooper, the ailing resident of Mostyn Mews, well portrayed by Peter Grist with Betty Franklin as his wife, Iris, set the scene very nicely aided by their spinster neighbour played by Pam Boxx. The bureaucrats played by Richard Hannay, Steve Field, and Virginia Crosbie were nicely balanced if a little wooden at times. The play moved quite smoothly towards its climax with a twist in the tail, much appreciated by the audience. The second play of the even-

ing was 'The Lover' by Harold Pinter, directed by Graham Lawson. This was a deep and subtle play involving a role-playing married couple and their 'extra marital affairs'. Beginning with the shock that Sarah, beautifully played by Julie Ham, was having an affair which was quietly accepted by her husband; confusing twists and turns then followed to show that 'the affair' was a game played between Sarah and her husband, Richard, played by Andrew Salmon thought it was much more than a game to the two players. Was the milkman (Del Hendrickson) having a fling with Sarah? All was made clear in the end, or was it?

The final play was 'Fluff' by John Scholes and directed by Geoff Barden. This was a delightful, silly comedy set in where the wealthy owner was throwing a party. Someone was trying to steal the guests' furs (the Fluff), and some of the guests were not what they seemed. The two main characters, Sally and Joe Goodwin, played by Rosie Coveney and Stuart McDill who were two 'naturals' in their parts and whenever present on stage demanded attention, led the play on at its merry pace. Sally has fallen for Nigel, played by Mike Dellow, whom she thinks is rich, but who along with Alice, played by Maxine Marlow, is really also after the 'fluff'. When Nigel decides to make a play for Sally it is left to Joe and Alice to complete

It was the final play that won the adjudicator's vote but the audience obviously decided that all the plays were winners in what was the best Ariel One Act Festival for some time. Nice one, Ariel!



The ZOW Hockey Club Festival -Nijmegen 86


As a result of the contacts with the Dutch Army through NORTHAG, the Rheindahlen Garrison Hockey Club was invited to take part in the annual club festival at Nijmegen on 31 May/ 1 June 1986. Along with a few 'guests', the Garrison side went to the ZOW club to find an excellent organisation and facilities for both hockey and social events. Some fourteen mens and fourteen ladies teams had been invited and the club had marked out five grass pitches all within a few dozen meters of the clubhouse. The Garrison side were identified by our Dutch hosts as 'old men' (the continental players stop playing top class hockey in their twenties) and, therefore likely to be easy opposition. It is true that at least three Garrison players were over 40, but several were in their twenties! Our first match was against the ZOW 1st XI who in a very tight game found the 'old men' of Garrison too hot to handle with Garrison winning 1-0. This was followed by a 2-1 win, three draws and a further 2-1 win to take the Garrison side through to the semi-finals. In another very tight matchagainst VVV, neither side managed to score and the match had to be decided by a 'penalty shuffle'

The Penalty Shuffle. This was a new one on the Garrison players, though on reflection it is a super way to decide a drawn game. Each

team selects three players, who alternately run the ball from the halfway line towards a goal defended only by the opposing keeper. The attacker has 20 seconds, two saves by the keeper or before the ball goes out of play to score. He can score from anywhere on the pitch by any 'legal' means. It is a test of skill for both the attacking players and the keeper. The Garrison side unused to the penalty shuffle were well beaten by VVV who went on to win the final (also on penalties). It was then on to the playoff for 3/4 place with players beginning to tire after seven matches in two days with only a long night of socialising to break the monotony. In the play off, the Garrison side continued to show the speed and aggresion that is their hallmark and scored two excellent goals with the opposition scoring a fine solo effort. The good Garrison performance in the festival and the excellent social side have done much towards Anglo-Dutch relations. It is hoped that the ZOW club can come to Rheindahlen later this year re-paid in part (and also to play some hockey). If we on and off the field we hope to be invited back next year. RAFG Rowing -RAF Championships and Joint Service Regattas

The RAFG and BAOR rowing squads departed from Germany on 15 May to compete in the 1986 RAF Championships and Joint-Service Regattas. Both events are held at Peterborough, over the same weekend, on the Peterborough Rowing Club's 1000-metre 6-lane course. The 2 squads of 10 RAF personnel and 9 Army assembled at Huntingdon Rowing Club on the morning of 16 May for a full day's practice session under the watchful eves of the RAFGRA team captain and coach, FS 'H' Firth and the club's rowing instructor and cox, Flt Lt Ray Wood.

Saturday dawned wet and windy, in complete contrast to the previous day; in fact the conditions were so poor that the course was shortened to 750 metres for the RAF Championships.

The RAFG Squad had entered the following men's

events: Novice Coxed IVs, Novice 'B' Coxed Pairs. Senior Coxed Pairs and Senior, Novice and Novice 'B' Sculls. In addition, the ladies had entered 3 events: the Novice and Open Coxed Pairs and Open Coxed IVs. The racing was extremely competitive and all the crews acquitted themselves exceptionally well with SAC Paddy Keogh winning his heat in the Novice 'B' Sculls, to be narrowly beaten into second place in the final by a sculler from RAF Benson. In the Novice 'B' Pairs, Cpl Mick Pocknell and SAC Andy Guy won their heat convincingly against 2 RAF Coltishall crews and one RAF Abdingdon crew. However, over-enthusiasm and tension in the final contributed to a single mistake by the RAFG third in a closely contested race. FS 'H' Firth and Flt Lt Duncan Henderson were knocked out of the Senior Pairs event in the first heat, both crews achieving a very

Unfortunately this was the only event of the day in which the fastest losers of the heats did not go into the final.



The ladies' events were just as competitive with the Ladies Open IV coming 3rd in the final. And in the final of the Ladies' Open Pairs Cpls (W) Penny Pockwell and Carol Frogatt were beaten by an RAF Akrotiri crew. In the Novice Pairs event SACWs Jenny Lee and Karen Heap had a convincing win in their heat but once again an unforced error in the final cost the girls the title. In fact their winning time in the heat was much faster than the RAF Digby crew's time in the final. The highlight of the day was the Men's Novice IVs and in a nerve-racking finish the RAFG crew managed to win by half a length to take the Novice IVs trophy to Germany for the first time. Following the race the cox was ceremoniously thrown into the water, a tradition not wholly enjoyed by coxes. The winning crew was as follows: Flt Lt Duncan Henderson - Bow, SAC Andy Guy - 2, Cpl Mick Pocknell - 3, SAC Paddy



Keogh - Stroke, and FS 'H' Firth - Cox. The RAFG teams were delighted especially with the strong support the squad had received from the BAOR contingent throughout the day.

Joint Service Regatta On Sunday at the Joint-Service Regatta the weather was even worse than the previous day; although reasonably dry, a very strong wind was blowing along the lenght of the 1000-metre course. The water conditions were very difficult with 11/2-foot waves occurring in places along the course. The BAOR squad of predominantly ladies from Int and Security Group Germany represented the WRAC in the following ladies' non-status events: Coxed IVs - 2 crews, Coxed Pairs - 3 crews, and the whole team in the Eights event. RAFG had been

selected to compete in the Ladies' Pairs and Men's Novice IVs events. But unfortunately neither team was successful even though the men's team reached the final. Loyalties were certainly stretched with both FS 'H' Firth and Flt Lt Ray Wood coxing the WRAC Germany crews. The WRAC ladies rowed exceptionally well considering the level of competition that they were against and the short time that the ladies have been rowing. Futhermore, because the ladies' events were non-status the WRAC Novices were competing againsts Senior and Open status ladies from the other Services. Even so, both the ladies, IV teams and 2 of the ladies pairs reached the finals of their events. However, due to the number of events in which the WRAC crews were entered compared to the Navy and WRAF crews and the very strong head wind encountered when rowing the 1000 metres to the start, the ladies were beaten in the finals by the fresher Navy and WRAF crews. In the event, the WRAC ladies were only a few seconds behind and had to settle for 3rd and 4th places and a weekend's valuable rowing experience. Next year the WRAF and Navy had better beware because the WRAC will be back at the Joint-Service Regatta again with more experience and an even greater will to win'. A final mention must go to the only male member of the BAOR squad, Cpl Dave Marshall, who put in a creditable performance in the Single Sculls, Novice IV and Novice Eights events for the Army. Desperately Seeking Susan '15' 99 mins

The pop star Madonna turns from black vinyl to the silver screen to star in this comedy thriller.

Susan (Madonna) and New Jersey housewife Roberta, (Rosanna Arquette) become involved in a case of mistaken identity, which is to change both their lives.

While visiting the hairdressers Roberta follows the romance of Susan and her boyfriend Jimmy (Roberta Jay) who arrange a rendezvous through the personal column of the local newspaper. Roberta decides to spy on the two at their next meeting and becomes involved in Susan's strange lifestyle. She loses her memory after being attacked by thugs looking for Susan and some priceless stolen earrings. Des (Aiden Quinn), a friend of Jimmys comes to Roberta's rescue. This is a delightful film with a good performance by Rosanna Arquette and it also boasts a lively soundtrack which includes 'Into the groove' by Madonna.

Invasion USA '18' 96 mins

Chuck Norris is back in this latest all action blockbuster produced by Menahem Golan and Yoram Globus, whose finances seem to have no limits. An army of international terrorists, organised by Russian Agent, Mikal Rostov (Richard Lynch) land on the beaches of Miami and their mission is to create as much chaos as is needed to break down the fabric of American society and turn everyone against each other, resulting in the demise of democracy. So retired US agent, Matt Hunter (Chuck Norris) is tempted out of retirement and his beloved everglades to take control of the situation, as it seems he is the only man in America that can save them. As fast as Norris takes care of one incident ten more seem to start, until he devises a plan to trap Rostow and his troops, and a mighty battle ensues in an exciting climax. Acting ability is not in great

Acting ability is not in great evidence here but full marks for action including car chases, exploding helicopters, murder and mayhem. The action doesn't cease from the opening minute of the film. Chuck Norris is invincible as ever and Richard Lynch is excellent as Rostov. The female interest is represented by Melissa Prophet, recenlty of 'The Cotton Club'' as a freelance photographer who is always where the action is.

Mask '15' 115 mins
This moving and endearing

movie is the true story of Rocky Dennis, a teenager who suffers from the disease Lionities, a calcium disorder of the skull, which leaves Rocky with an enlarged skull and facial deformaties. Eric Stolz gives a sensitive performance as Rocky, which emphasises his characters compassion, best seen when Rocky meets Diana, a blind girl, whom he helps on an adventure holiday. Cher, who won the best actress award for her portrayal of Rusty Dennis at the Cannes Film Festival in 1985, is superb as Rocky's mother. They both hang out with a bunch of Hells Angels whose leader is Gar, played by Sam Elliott, one of Rusty's ex lovers. Rusty's dependance on drugs makes her difficult to live with and both Rocky and Gar strive to help her through the bad times. Peter Bogdanovich (The Last Picture Show and Paper Moon) does an excellent job as director and it is guaranteed to bring a tear to the eye of the most hardened viewer.

Electric Dreams 'PG' 96 mins Lenny von Dohlen plays Miles, an architect with a junior job but an ambition to design a brick that will withstand earthquakes. He has to organise himself so that he can do both, and the solution he comes up with, is getting a computer. He ends up with every conceivable computer accessory you can think of, but an accident with a bottle of champagne and an overload gives the computer a personality all of its own. Now Edgar wants Miles undivided attention. Unfortunately Miles cannot give all his time to Edgar, as he has fallen for Madeleine, a beautiful young musician (Virginia Madsen) who has moved into the apartment above. Good entertainment with some amusing moments and good music from Heaven 17, Culture Club, Georgie Morader and Phil Oakey.


