INTRODUCTION

The Rheindahlen Military Complex

The Rheindahlen Base is one of the largest military establishments in Europe and is estimated to have cost over £15,000,000 to build. It was erected over a period of 2 years on 16 acres of the Rheindahlen forest some 5 miles west of Mönchengladbach.

The actual construction commenced in the autumn of 1952 and the first buildings were occupied by the end of 1954. Whilst excavating the foundations it was discovered that this area had been a Roman establishment and Julius Caesar mentioned it in "De Bello Gallico". There is a 2nd century cemetery under the Officers' Mess and the relics that were unearthed at the site showed that the area was occupied in 2000 B.C.


250 years ago the Duke of Marlborough billeted his armies on the site and camp litter found near a local pond shows that some Cossacks of the Napoleonic period had also camped here.

The Joint Headquarters was built to a joint specification by the Royal Engineers and over 2,000 German contractors. The JHQ itself has over 3,000 offices and for those interested in statistics the main corridor is 300 yards long and there are 4 others of 100 yards. The German telephone engineers estimated that they had to solder 20 million joints in the wiring for the Rheindahlen complex. In addition there are some 70 miles of high and low pressure water pipes which provide central heating and hot water to all buildings and this system alone cost £1,500,000.

The Rheindahlen Military Base has become well-known throughout the region and during the summer it is quite customary to see coachloads of sightseers passing through as part of their tourist sightseeing itineraries.

This Booklet is intend for guidance only and should not be quoted as an authority.

Eurocheques

Most German banks now issue Eurocheques to their customers. Sadly, they fail to explain how to use them or the dangers of misuse.

Danger! Once completed, a Eurocheque is effectively a banknote and may be encashed by anyone because of the nasty little words "oder Überbringer" ("or Bearer") halfway down the left hand side. Crossing these words off invalidates the cheque. Safeguards are suggested below.

If you lose your cheques, report the loss to your bank at the start of the next working day - even if it involves the cost of a phone call from your holiday resort. Always follow this phone call with a letter.

Keep your cheque card and cheque book separate, never both in the same pocket or handbag.

Never carry completed Eurocheques around in case you lose them. They are cash. Complete the cheque at the point of purchase. Losing even a blank eurocheque is equivalent to losing cash.

How to fill in your German Cheques

- a) "Zahlen Sie gegen diesen Scheck" means "Pay on production of this cheque".
- b) The amount you wish to be paid must be written clearly on the line above "Betrag in Buchstaben" ("Amount in words"). You may write the amount in English or German many prefer English and may use the form "Umpteen D-marks and several pfgs" but it is not necessary to include the pfgs. here.
- c) "Währung" = "Currency". If you leave this blank and the payee inserts "£" you may end up paying four times more than if you had written in "DM".
- d) "Betrag" = "Amount".

This can cause confusion as Continental conventions are different: they tend to embellish the figures "1" and "7" and whereas we follow the thousands digit with a comma and use a decimal point, the Continentals follow the thousands digit with a full stop and use a decimal comma.

The only way is to make your instructions to the bank as clear as possible. A suggested method is: Whole DM figures: DM 1.000..... (line to end of box prevents the unscrupulous inserting more figures to the detriment of your overdraft). With pfennigs involved: DM 23-32 pfg.

- e) "An" = "to": The person to whom you wish payment made. Many firms have a stamp to place here make sure you see the cheque stamped before you leave it.
- f) "Ort" = "place": Where you are when you sign the cheque. If you are on the Garrison, "JHQ". Anywhere else, even if you cannot spell it, have a go and amuse your bank manager.
- g) "Datum" = "Date": the date you sign the cheque. Don't get involved in "post-dated" cheques they can still be encashed early even by mistake and are valid once signed. In the UK, cheques more than six months old are referred to drawer for further validation. Over here, once the cheque is signed, it is valid forever.
- h) "Unterschrift" = "Signature" Do use the one registered at the bank.

Crossing. If the cheque is not for "CASH" and is a payment to another person or firm, cross it (across the top left hand corner) with the words "Nur zur Verrechnung". This means that the cheque cannot be exchanged for cash and may only be paid into a bank account, anybody's admittedly,

but it can be traced and recovered if it gets into the wrong hands.

If you are using a Eurocheque card you must turn the cheque over and insert the card number ("Karten-Nr.") in the space marked "N".

Completion Outside Germany. Ask your bank how to complete cheques in local currency before you go on leave.

Cashing a cheque on Saturdays. German Post Offices will cash British and German cheques on production of a bankers card and are open on Saturday mornings. The service costs DM 2,-.

BUYING GOODS TAX FREE

Exemption from both UK and German VAT can be gained in certain circumstances.

German Mehrwertsteuer

Exemption can only be gained if the purchase is made through a Mess, Institute or Club (MIC) registered with an Official Procurement Agency (OPA). This means that the purchase must be paid for by cheque or Bank Credit Transfer drawn upon the MIC's official account. The purchase must also be entered in the MIC's register.

Procedure. For personnel in Rheindahlen the normal procedure for gaining VAT exemption on purchases is to obtain an official order from your MIC representative, currently:

For Army Personnel:

Officers' Mess Treasurer Garrison Warrant Officers' and Sergeants' Mess Supervising Officer.

For Corporals and below: PRI Clerk, Garrsion HQ.

For **RAF Personnel**:

HQ RAFG Officers' Mess Reception Sergeants' Mess Secretary. For Corporals and below: PSI Clerk in SHQ. You must ensure that the firm which you wish to make the purchase with agrees to your terms, before you buy. They will complete the order form.

The following must be handed back to the MIC:

- 1. Completed order form.
- 2. Personal cheque for the value of the order.
- 3. A small handling charge, normally between DM 1 and DM 3.

The MIC issue an Abwicklungsschein and a cheque on their official account for you to take to the firm or arrange for the bill to be paid directly. On receipt of these, the firm will normally release the goods.

It is emphasised that the use of personal cheques and privately acquired Abwicklungsscheine contravenes BFG Standing Orders and German Custom Regulations.

UK VAT. Whilst serving in BFG, any purchases you make in the UK to bring to Germany may be classed as exports - zero rated for VAT purposes. Not all UK firms are interested in the paperwork involved so you must first obtain their agreement. The procedure is too involved for this article but includes registering the purchase with the German Customs on import and claiming the VAT back from the firm. Most firms will not process VAT-free purchases under £100. Many mail order firms will export goods VAT-free to BFPO addresses, but, once again, some firms cannot be bothered with the paperwork. This is worth a try though. Consult HM Customs for further details.

Procedure for refund of Dutch BTW (VAT). Apply on BFG Form 60 to the British Frontier Service for an import certificate (BFG FORM 80). When bringing the goods into Germany present the Form 80, passport and BFG identity card to the German Customs who will keep the F80.

Pay and Accounting Matters - Army Personnel Garrison Pay Office

Location. The Garrison Pay Office is located inside the JHQ Compound opposite Entrance 6. Access is through Gate C.

Pay Queries. Staff are available to handle officers' and soldiers' queries on pay, allowances, charges and claims;

- a. Mon-Fri 0900-1300 hrs.
- b. Mon/Tue/Thu 1430-1530 hrs.

Cashier.

The Cashier handles all cash transactions including:

- 1. Payment of claims, and credit vouchers.
- 2. Casual Pay.
- 3. Receipt of debit vouchers.
- 4. Youth Training Scheme pay (nominated days only).
- 5. PRI garage bills.

The Cashiers desk is open on normal working days.

Mon-Fri 0900-1300 hrs Mon/Tue/Thu 1430-1530 hrs

BFG Petrol Coupons - Army Personnel BFG Petrol Coupons are on sale on normal

working days.

Mon-Fri 0900-1300 hrs.

Delays. Many people leave the purchase of coupons to the last minute before going on leave. As a result, queues can form delaying your purchase as much as ½ an hour. Times to avoid are:

- 1. Summer Fridays.
- 2. The 11/2 working days before any Grant.
- 3. The last working day of any month.
- 4. First 3 working days of April when the rush to exchange the previous year's coupons is at its height. (Previous year's coupons may be exchanged from the first working day in April until the last Friday in May.)

Priority. On the infrequent occasions when a particularly long queue forms, the following will be served first.

- 1. Personnel of Army units administered for pay by the Garrison Pay Office.
- 2. Civilian personnel based on Rheindahlen Garrison.
- 3. BE. FR and US personnel registered with the Garrison Pay Office.
- 4. NL personnel based in Rheindahlen.

Payment. Payment for BFG Petrol Coupons may be made in cash or by Eurocheque supported by a personally presented Eurocheque Card.

Pay and Accounting Matters - RAF Personnel

Location of PSF and Accts Fit. The Personnel Services and Accounts Flight are located within Station Headquarters RAF Rheindahlen.

Pay and Allowances Queries. Queries on pay and allowances should be made direct to either your appropriate PD clerk or to the allowances clerks. Staff are available in PSF during the following hours:

Mon-Fri 0830 - 1230 hrs & 1345 - 1700 hrs.

Please note, however, that the Personnel Documentation Points close for all but urgent and compassionate matters for two days per month for the purpose of calculating monthly pays. The precise dates of these closures are published in SRO's.

Cashier's Office. The Cashier handles all public cash transactions. Additionally, the Cashier sells BFG Petrol Coupons and cashes UK Cheques within current regulations. The Cashier's office is located within SHQ RAF Rheindahlen. A limited service is also provided on 2 mornings a week within the JHQ building by entrance 33. The Cashier's opening hours are as follows:

Personnel are requested to purchase their coupons from the PCIO appropriate to their place of duty, thereby avoiding the large

queues that are normally experienced at the Cashier's office.

Accommodation Stores

Whether you are Army, RAF, or Civilian, if you live in a married Quarter or Hiring, your accommodation stores will be provided by the Supply Flight of the Engineering and Supply Squadron RAF Rheindahlen. You will find a comprehensive guide to local arrangements in your quarter, but please remember that the staff are there to help you. Two useful telephone numbers are:

- a) Barrack Control Office JHQ 4742 -for general queries and requests.
- b) Supply Control and Accounting Flight (SCAF) JHQ 4741 for inventory queries.

Germany to Britain

Telephone calls to Britain (including Northern Ireland) - dial 0044 plus the regional code, omitting the initial digit, e.g. to phone Birmingham (Code 021) dial 0044-21-before the number. Telephone calls to UK are 25% cheaper on weekdays between 1800 and 0800, weekend and public holidays if you dial direct. Operator connected calls are more expensive.

Dialling in to the JHQ Rheindahlen Exchange

From Mönchengladbach - Dial 47 plus the extension number required

From Rheydt - Dial 747 plus the extension number required.

From elsewhere in Germany - Dial 02161-47 plus the extension number required.

From the UK - Dial 010-49-2161-47 plus the extension number required.


N.B. The number for directory enquiries at JHQ is 2311. They hold Military, German and British civilian directories.

Where and how you can make a telephone call

You can make a telephone call from any post office or from any of the many yellow call boxes. You will recognise call boxes from which you can also make calls to other countries by the green sign.

You will find one of the two kinds of payphone depicted below.





The telephone network here is fully automatic. That means you can dial all your inland calls yourself without the assistance of an operator. Subscriber trunk dialling (STD) facilities are also available to more than 90 other countries.

Cost

For calls from a public payphone it is advisable to insert first of all three 10 Pfennig pieces. You may then insert coins in any order you wish. Accounting is performed in charge units of DM 0,23 according to actual call duration. Any wholly unused coins will be returned.

Area Code

You will find a list of dialling codes for all countries which can be reached by STD and the most frequently used codes for the local telephone area in a yellow booklet called AVON, copies of which are kept at all post offices.

Directory Enquiries

If you have any questions regarding a country code or a telephone number ring Directory Enquiries. For trunk calls within the service area of Deutsche Bundespost 118 or 0118, for international trunk calls 00118

Installing the Telephone

If you are not entitled to an official telephone in your home, you may have one installed by the Bundespost at your own expense. The forms requesting a phone installation can be obtained from any German Post Office. The waiting list for a phone is only a few weeks and the installation charge is DM 200,00 which will appear on your first bill. If there is already a phone in your quarter, it will only cost DM 40,00 to have this reconnected, provided it is undertaken within 2 months of the previous disconnection. Alternatively, if you have had a telephone in Germany within the last twelve months you can have one installed in your new home for only DM 55,-.

Deciphering your Telephone Bill

We have reproduced the telephone bill below. Notice that each box is numbered in the lower left corner and the boxes of most interest to Forces' subscribers with a civil phone will be explained.

- **1.** The basic monthly charge for your telephone is DM 27.
- **2.** Charges for extra equipment, such as extensions and push button telephones.
- **3.** Charges for installation and modifications. On your first bill there will be a charge of DM 200 for the initial installation.
- **4. and 5.** The number of message units used not the number of calls made! Each local call is one message unit, but for long distance calls the number of units depends on when and how long you call. Each subscriber is allowed 20 units free of charge, so if you use 155 units, you only pay for 135.
- **6.** The charge of the message units obtained by multiplying the number of units in Box 5 by the charge for a unit, which is officially 23 Pfennig.
- 8. If you have not paid your last bill on time you will be charged here. Each bill must be paid by the time the next months bill is sent out, and you will also be charged for reminders, which are sent out if the bill is not paid after seven days.
- **13.** Charge for telegrams and long distance calls made through the operator.
- **19.** Amount carried forward from previous unpaid bills.
- **20.** Refunds for overpayments or wrong payments, for example, if you have paid a reminder as well as the original bill by mistake.
- 21. The amount you must pay.

The two dates underneath are the date on which your meter was read (Zählerablesetag), and the date when the bill was posted to you (Absendetag). You should pay within seven days of this date, via your bank or at any Post Office.



X/Y Scheme - Married Quarters fuel and light charges

As a general rule, we in Germany occupy larger Married quarters, endure more severe winters and face higher fuel cost than our United Kingdom counterparts. In order to redress the balance, the X/Y scheme was introduced to ensure that, despite these factors, we are not obliged to pay more on fuel and light than we would expect to pay at home.

Briefly, the X factor is the amount of money which the occupant of the quarter would normally expect to spend annually on fuel and light if living in the United Kingdom. The Y factor is a fixed assessment of fuel and light for a particular quarter. This assessment varies with the size of quarter and it is expected that most occupants of quarters will consume fuel and light up to the quantities allowed for the Y factor.

Annually, on 1st October and at marchout all X/Y accounts are balanced. Those who have consumed less than their allowance will receive a rebate and conversely those who exceed their allowance will be debited for the excess. In order to alleviate the burden of a huge bill at the end of the annual balancing, the amount of the X factor is deducted from your salary on a daily basis, there being a different rate for the summer and winter months.

Waiver of Charges. Occupants of quarters with shared facilities i.e. heating and domestic hot water can apply for a waiver of charges when vacating their quarters for periods in excess of seven days; charges may also be waived if the central heating plant becomes unserviceable.

Keeping a Check On Your Consumption.

Shortly after moving into your quarter you should receive a computer print-out of your fuel and light allowance; this and a record of your meter readings at march-in will serve as a useful guide in monitoring your usage of fuel and light. Your allowance of electricity covers cooking, lighting and service supplied electrical appliances only and additional items such as washing machines half-filled freezers and tumble driers are heavy consumers of electricity, so it pays to keep a close watch on your consumption. If you have any questions or queries regarding the X/Y scheme you should contact the Engineering and Supply Sqn X/Y Cell on JHQ 4745.

Rubbish Clearance

Dustbin Clearance - JHQ

Dustbins are emptied once a week. All married quarters North East of Gloucester Drive have collections on Tuesdays and those to the South West of Gloucester Drive on Fridays. Should one of these days fall on a German Public Holiday, an alternative day will be notified in Orders.

On collection days place your bins at the pavement edge by 0800 hrs. Only "official" bins with properly closed lids will be emptied. Do not pack your bin too tightly. When tipped up, the contents are expected freely to fall out. The dustman is forbidden, by law, to use his hands to free the contents. All kinds of kitchen and domestic rubbish, paper, bottles, cans, ash, sweepings etc. may be placed in the same bin, provided it is not overloaded, but the following are prohibited: hot ashes or cinders, fluids, acids, snow or ice, earth, corpses or excrement of animals, large

amounts of garden refuse, carbide, explosives of any kind, stones or heavy metal objects which may damage the interior of the garbage truck.

Mark your bins. The dustmen are not very particular where they leave your bins after emptying them. Therefore, paint on your house number, as a safeguard against loss.

Bulk refuse collection - JHQ

Bulk refuse collection from married quarters are as follows:

1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month, all married quarters to the North East of Gloucester Drive.

2nd and 4th Wednesday of each month, all married quarters to the South West of Gloucester Drive.

As with the normal collection, should one of these days fall on a German Public Holiday, then an alternative day will be notified in Orders. Where there are five Wednesdays in the month, no bulk refuse is collected from married quarters on the fifth Wednesday. Box, tie up or otherwise secure your bulk refuse to avoid it being blown about, and place it at the pavement edge by 0730 hrs on collection days. But a note of warning! Everything goes, so do not use containers for which you have any further use. You will not see them again.

Items too large for Bulk Refuse (e.g. furniture) can sometimes be removed by the c/o Sports and Estates (Ring 2097).





Chimney Sweeping

Sweeping chimneys in Germany is a municipal responsibility, backed by laws which require all chimneys to be swept and inspected by a licensed district master chimney sweep twice per year. Most chimneys are swept under these arrangements by a vacuum sweep lowered down the chimney, obviating the need for access. However, MQ occupants should note that it is an offence under German Law to deny reasonable entry to the sweep (the "Bezirksschornsteinfegermeister") should he require access to complete his sweep or conduct a smoke emission test. The bill, a sum fixed by the municipal authority, is paid centrally by Accounts Flight. Any problems with chimneys should be reported in the first instance to your Families/ Estates Officer.

German Laws which affect you

Some matters which are not offences in UK can be contrary to German Law. The following are only examples, but when in Germany it is most important that you take notice of the local laws and customs and that you try to adapt your behaviour to fit in with the life-style of the Host Nation.



Control of Children

Heads of families are held responsible in German law for the mis-behaviour of their children to a much greater extent than is the case in English law. Failure to exercise supervision and control may lead to prosecution in a German court.

Parents may be held responsible in the German courts for damage caused by their children even if no proceedings are brought in the criminal courts and it is very difficult to avoid liability for such claims. Heads of families are therefore advised to obtain insurance against such liabilities. Policies of this kind are almost universally taken out by German families; they offer adequate protection at very reasonable rates.



Cleaning of Pavements

Occupants of married quarters and MOD hirings are responsible for cleaning snow and ice from the area outside their houses and for scattering salt, sand or ashes to prevent pedestrians from slipping. The cleaning of pavements is not one of the free services to which the Forces are entitled. Failure to observe this obligation may lead to prosecution under German law. Occupants are also responsible for clearing leaves in their gardens and outside their houses.



Community Relations

Occupants of married quarters and MOD hirings should be aware of the following German laws which may affect their relationship with German neighbours:

1. Washing of private cars on the public highway is prohibited at any time. Caravans may not be parked on public roads, except when preparing for or unpacking from a journey.

- 2. There are restrictions on the burning of garden rubbish and the beating of carpets at certain times of the week.
- **3.** Washing is not to be hung outside to dry after 1400 hrs on Saturdays or at any time on Sundays or Public Holidays.
- **4.** Children are not permitted to play noisily in gardens or public places after 1900. Some games such as football, skipping, hopscotch and roller skating are prohibited on public roads.
- **5.** Occupants are obliged to keep grass trimmed.
- 6. Any person in charge of a dog on public or private land must ensure that the dog does not endanger any persons or property. A dog must be kept on a lead in parks, and it is the responsibility of the person in charge of a dog to ensure that the dog does not soil the pavement. Dog owners must ensure that their dogs do not run loose or cause a disturbance by barking or howling. A dog known to be ferocious must be muzzled or on a leash of a maximum length of one metre and an adult must be in charge of it. Dogs should not be let loose on open country. They may be shot in certain circumstances such as if they are found on shooting land. Cats may also be shot under similar circumstances.

Skills and Services Register

The information Room in the RAF Education Centre maintains a register of people in the Rheindahlen Military Com-

plex who offer skills and services, both voluntarily and for payment.

The register includes people prepared to undertake such diverse services as:

Dressmaking and alterations
Driving lessons
Gardening
Car repairs
Car cleaning
Upholstering
Loosecover making
China mending
Electrical repairs
Hairdressing/Beautician
Printing/Engraving
Picture framing

This is by no means a comprehensive list and, obviously, the register contains a constantly changing range of skills, depending on postings in and out. The register also acts as a link between people prepared to undertake voluntary work and organisations and individuals seeking helpers.

If you would like to register yourself or any member of your family, call into the Information Room and fill in a card. Please remember that you need the Garrison/Station Commanders permission to trade for remuneration and you should bring a certificate to this effect with you if you wish to register for paid work.

Alternatively, if you are looking for someone to undertake some work for you, call in or ring JHQ 4784.



Travel to the UK

Flights

Concessionary fares are available on British Airways and Lufthansa flights between Düsseldorf and various UK airports through Service Air (Düsseldorf mil Ext 215) and PSI flights (Wildenrath mil Ext 297). Düsseldorf to Heathrow costs £55-£87 return. Service Air also run Charter flights to Newcastle (£98 return) and Glasgow (£106 return) and offer a coach service to the south and west of England from Heathrow.



Ferries. Ferry bookings can be made at reduced Forces Rates on most routes to the UK. The RAF Information Room holds brochures on these concessionary rates and bookings can be made through the JHQ Travel Agents near the NAAFI.

Lifts to and from UK. The RAF Information Room keeps a book for people offering or seeking a lift to and from the UK. Mutual arrangements are made as regards the sharing of petrol costs.

Coach Travel. One of the cheapest ways to travel to the UK is by coach, although the disadvantages of this method of travel are the long journey and sometimes antisocial arrival times. Details and bookings can be obtained from JHQ Travel Agents, and the RAF Information Room has details of some coaches.

Holiday Facilities belonging to Allied Forces. British Forces personnel may stay in certain clubs and hostels owned by Allied Services. The Americans have holiday facilities in Southern Germany and Italy and the French and Belgians have Officers' Clubs in various European cities. Enquiries about the use of these facilities should be directed to the US Support Unit (Ext 5392) and the Belgian (Ext 5263) and French (Ext 3184) Liaison officers.

Travel on the Bundesbahn


Every railway station has departure schedules (Abfahrt). Printed on a yellow background, they list all of the trains, in chronological order, which depart from this station. The destination and major stops with arrival times are also listed, as well as the platform (Gleis) of departure. Further information can be obtained at the Information Office or the ticket counter.

A useful booklet called "Welcome to Germany and its Railroad System" can be obtained at the RAF Information Room or Mönchengladbach Railway Station.

Rail tickets can also be obtained at Milatravel.

Buses

The system varies from place to place, but basically you have the option of buying a ticket as you enter the bus or, in the town, purchasing one or more tickets from the automatic machines near a bus stop if you know the fare.

Once on the bus put the ticket in the machine (see picture) for stamping. It is not valid until stamped. There are no returns on German buses, but you can buy a ticket that will take you from one side of the town to the other, even if it involves changing buses, provided that you complete the journey within the minimum practicable time.

There is a regular civilian bus service between the Garrison and Mönchengladbach Hauptbahnhof (main railway station). Route No. 023 will take you direct from JHQ to Mönchengladbach and back and 026 will take you to Wickrath via Rheindahlen Village. Further information on bus services is available at the RAF Information Room.

Children under 4 years travel free. Children 4 and under 14 travel at reduced fares.



A Visit to Berlin

Service personnel or sponsored civilians who wish to visit Berlin on leave must obtain official permission to do so. Permission will only be granted on production of proof of accommodation so it is necessary to arrange this before applying. All arrangements for travel to Berlin must be made through the relevant Personal Documentation Point (RAF) or Leave and Movements Office (Army) in Rheindahlen well in advance of the proposed journey.

Documentation.

Complete in quadruplicate:

- 1. RAF-Annex A to HQRAFG SAI Part II Section I Instruction No. 22.
- 2. Army-Appendix 1 to Annex A to BAOR Standing Orders Part IV Chapter 5 Section I

This is your authority to be in Berlin and must be carried with you at all times whilst you are there.

A British Travel Document (BTD) will be made out for you on presentation of your ID Card or full British Passport. If you wish to take visitors from UK with you to Berlin, you will need to show photocopies of the front cover of their passports. The BTD is your authority to travel through East Germany.

Travelling to Berlin.

When actually travelling to Berlin you must have in your possession:

- 1. The form described above.
- 2. BTD.
- 3. Your ID Card (in perfect condition and correct in detail) or valid full British Passport without any East German visas or transit stamps.

If you are travelling by car, you will also need:

- 1. Car documents (including insurance valid for the DDR).
- 2. Driving Licence.

By Road. On arrival at the border, report to the RMP checkpoint Alpha. Your documentation will be checked and you will be briefed on driving through the Berlin Corridor. You must have a full tank of petrol and check your oil and water before setting out.

By Rail. All sponsored visitors to Berlin are entitled to travel on the British Military train. Places on the train should be booked during the initial documentation. The train, which travels daily to and from Berlin (except for Christmas Day) is free and meals can be obtained for a small charge. Travellers may join a reserved coach on a Bundesbahn train at Hannover and transfer to the Military Train at Braunschweig, or go direct to Braunschweig and join the train there.

Accommodation.

Edinburgh House. This is the Berlin equivalent of Cassels House. Although it is primarily for people moving in and out of quarters in Berlin and for duty visitors, it will take leave visitors on a fill-up basis. The hotel is centrally placed and reasonable priced and is, therefore, very popular. Bookings, through your unit, should be made well in advance. The address and phone number for enquiries is:

Other Hotels. The RAF Information Room has lists of hotels and guest houses in Berlin.

The USAF Officers' Club. The club will also take visitors if space is available. Their telephone number is 030 819 5319/5591.

Sightseeing.

The best way to see the city is to join one of the guided tours:

BMWS, in conjunction with 46 AEC, runs tours of East and West Berlin at a cost of DM 5.00. The tour starts from Summit House at 0900 firs every Saturday. These tours are very popular and need to be booked in advance. Bookings may be made by telephone 030 309 4526 or in person at the BMWS office on the 5th floor of Summit House.

RAF Gatow runs tours on alternate Sundays, except during January and February when normally only one tour per month is arranged. The tour, which can be booked through the RAF Education Centre - 309 2629 -costs DM 2.00.

Bookings can be made through Edinburgh House for commercially run tours (eg Berliner Bären Stadtrundfahrt) but these are considerably more expensive.

GETTING A JOB

Any service dependant who wants to find a job here should register with 1 PLSU in Bedford Walk (off Queens Avenue) and/or with the RAF Civil Labour Office in SHQ.

Opening hours for registrations:

1 PLSU Mon - Fri 0830 - 1230 RAF Mon - Fri 0830 - 1230 and 1345 - 1700

Any one registering for work must produce their ID Card or Passport with status stamp. The PLSU provides labour for all Army units and Army sponsored units in Rheindahlen, Bracht and Birgelen and the RAF Office for all RAF units. However, both accept registrations from Army, RAF and civilian dependants.

Jobs are at premium here and, unless you have particularly saleable skill, you may well have to wait some time for a job to become available, so register as soon as you arrive. You cannot be put on a waiting list before you arrive.

Dependants who are looking for work in the Mönchengladbach or Viersen areas should register with A Det 4 PCLU which is situated in Ayrshire Barracks.

If you are a German speaker and would like to try to find work on the German net, register with the German Arbeitsamt, Lürriperstraße 78-80, telephone MG 4041.

Finally, you can also register with the American Employment Office in Hindenburgstraße 200, telephone MG 16632.

Car Registration

Car owners have two months to register their car with British Forces Germany (BFG) after they arrive and those who buy a car from a German source must have it BFG'd before they are allowed to drive it.

Any car which is more than two years old must be tested for roadworthiness at a test centre before it can be BFG'd. This test can be arranged through 68 Sqn RCT (Army) by ringing ext 2844 or Mechanical Transport Flight (RAF) on ext 4229. It is the BFG equivalent of the MOT Test and a certificate of roadworthiness is issued if the car passes.

To apply for registration, fill in BFG Form 20 and send it to the BFG Licensing Office, Command Pay Office, BFPO 40, enclosing:

- 1. UK registration book
- 2. Proof of insurance cover (either the green card or the policy or cover note).
- 3. Certificate of roadworthiness.
- 4. A gummed return label with your address on it.

German Cars

German cars bought locally must be tested at the BFG Centre. A potential purchaser would be well advised to make it a condition of purchase that the car passes the test before any payment is made. The car must then be deregistered with the German authorities. While all this is being done, the car must be parked in a safe place and not driven until the BFG documents arrive. Apply on BFG Form 20 and enclose:

- German log book and deregistration certificate.
- 2. Bill of sale
- 3. Proof of insurance
- 4. Return label

New Cars

In the case of a new car or a car under two years old, no roadworthiness certificate is required. Apply on Form 20 and send:

- 1. Proof of insurance
- 2. Proof of ownership, log book or shipping note.
- 3. Return label

However, these cars must have a lighting check.

Buying and Selling a Second Hand BFG Registered Car

If you sell your car to another person entitled to BFG facilities, you should draw a line diagonally across the 'Petrol Issues' page of the BFG Registration Card (BFG Form 73) and write on this same page Transferred to (new owner) on (date)' and sign this. You then give this card and the



windscreen label to the new owner and get a receipt from him for them.

The new owner then applies in the normal fashion for BFG registration, enclosing proof of insurance, proof of ownership, the old BFG Form 73 and the windscreen label. In order to obtain a refund on a German Insurance Policy, you will need a certificate of deregistration. The BFG Licensing Office will issue one on request if you send the receipt from the new owner for the BFG Form 73 and an SAE.

Driving Licence

If you posses a current UK or International Driving Licence valid in Germany, you may drive on this licence for one month from the date of your arrival. However, after this, all drivers must be in possession of a BFG Driving Licence. In order to obtain this, or a provisional licence, you will have to take a written examination, in the form of a tick test, on German traffic laws and road signs. To help you learn these, you can obtain a copy of the 'Manual for Road Users in Germany, Belgium and Holland' from your unit. If you do not hold a valid driving licence and wish to apply for a provisional licence, you will first have to pass the tick test. Once you have received instruction, you may take a driving test under unit arrangements. A BFG driving licence may be exchanged for a full UK licence without taking a UK driving test.

It must be noted that a BFG licence is valid for dependants in Germany only. Dependants must hold a UK or International Licence in order to drive in any other European country. For a serviceman, a BFG licence is also valid in Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg and Denmark.

International Licence

An International licence can be obtained from the Straßenverkehrsamt, Rheinstraße

- 60, Mönchengladbach, on presentation of:
- 1. British or BFG driving licence
- 2. 2 x passport sized photographs
- 3. DM 7.70
- 4. Passport

The licence will be issued on the spot.

Legal Requirements for Cars in Germany

- 1. A warning triangle with the DIN approved symbol.
- 2. An unopened First Aid kit to specification DIN 13-1-64.
- 3. a. If manufactured in 1965 or thereafter, passenger vehicles and light cargo vehicles must be fitted with three point body restraining seat belts, of approved design and in working order, for use of the driver and front seat passengers.
- b. If manufactured on or after 1 May 1979, such seat belts must also be fitted for the use of all rear seat passengers.
- 4. Steering lock.
- 5. Four way flashers.
- 6. One (LHD) and two (RHD) external rear view mirrors.
- 7. Also recommended, though not mandatory, are a tow rope, fire extinguisher and spare petrol can.
- 8. The following documents must be carried with you when driving:
- a. Proof of insurance
- b. Indentity Card
- c. Driving Licence
- d. Vehicle Registration Card (BFG Form 73)

Police Fines

The German Police are empowered to impose and collect fines of up to DM 40 on the spot in cases of violation of traffic regulations. If a road user considers that he is innocent of the alleged offence, he can refuse to pay the fine and request that his case be tried in court. You are advised to ask for a receipt if the fine is paid on the spot. It is also advisable to ensure that you always have DM 40 or a cheque on you, to pay any spot fine you may incur.

Children's Education

Children are eligible to start primary school at the beginning of the term in which they are five. They transfer to secondary school at the age of eleven.


Information

The Volkshochschule or 'Peoples High School' is the German version of an Adult Education college. Classes are in German, but there is a useful and comprehensive set of courses in German for foreigners (Deutsch für Ausländer) which starts at a very basic level and gradually builds up vocabulary and conversational ability.

The Volkshochschule in Mönchengladbach is situated in Bismarckstr. No. 99, Telephone MG 27022-45-49. Enrolment is by semester and costs between DM 10.00



and DM 50.00 per term depending on the number of instructional hours.

Some Local Customs

Your contact with Germany will be much more enjoyable if you take an interest in some of the local traditions. Here are just a few examples.

Schützenfest

Many villages in this part of Germany hold an annual festival known as a "Schützenfest". This is a sort of huntsmen's festival at which the "Schützenkönig" - the king of the huntsmen - is crowned. The Schützenkönig has to win a shooting competition but, since he needs to be fairly well off to keep up his entertaining commitments during his period in office, the result of the competition is often a foregone conclusion.

A CBM 64 computer is also available for hire along with a collection of games.

Kirmes

You will see advertised on posters throughout the Mönchengladbach area, especially in Summer, a village festival called "Kirmes". This was traditionally held to celebrate the consecration of the local church. There are the usual fun-fairs, market stalls and dances, though the religious origins are also not ignored and the church is very much involved in the festival.

Karneval

The Karneval season is a speciality of the Rheinland, It begins on the 11th day in the 11th month at 11 a.m., but things really "hot up" during the weeks leading up to Lent. The highlights, apart from the numerous Karneval Balls and drinking and joke sessions, known as "Sitzungen", are the processions held in Cologne, Düsseldorf and Mainz on the day before Shrove Tuesday, known as "Rosenmontag". Mönchengladbach has its procession on the following day, "Veilchendienstag", and there is always a childrens procession and smaller celebration in Rheindahlen village on the Sunday.

Weinfeste

All along the Rhine and Mosel during late Summer and early Autumn, there are wine festivals. Each village selects a different time, but the pattern is fairly standard: plenty of drinking and merry-making. However, it is a good thing to go with somebody who knows something about wine, because you may end up paying more for wine than you would in the local supermarket!

Der Rhein in Flammen

Taking place from July to October in various locations, the "Rhine in Flames" is a spectacle not to be missed. Best seen from the river itself at Koblenz, the illuminations along this romantic stretch of the Rhine provide one of the sights of Germany.



Germany, like UK, has a wide selection of Supermarkets and Department stores, most of which are in the town centres and easily found. Below, we list a few which are more out of the way, but well worth a visit.

Handelshof MG 52021 Roermonderstraße 471, Mon-Fri 0730-2030 hrs.

This is a wholesale warehouse for which a card is required. These can be borrowed from clubs and messes. Good value for bulk purchases although not everything is sold in bulk - it is possible to buy individual items. Cheap for household cleaning materials (in large size containers) and freezer items, also clothing, gardening, electrical, etc. depts. Signposted from the end of the main road through Hardt.

Massa MG 664071 Krefelderstr. 643

This is a very large supermarket with a household dept. Good for tools and car parts and accessories. The butchery and delicatessen depts. are also good value and have a wide selection. Plenty of car parking space. Take the Mönchengladbach/Neuwerk turn off the motorway. Massa is about 2 miles along the road on the left - a large blue building.

1. The Rheindahlen Garrison Tennis Courts controlled by the Army are Courts Nos 1-12 opposite the Blue Pool and Courts 13-14 next to No 1 Civilian Mess.

Courts 1-12 can be booked at the Club House opposite the Blue Pool, and except for some set periods there is no prior booking for courts 13 & 14.

The rules for the usage of the courts are published in Garrison Routine Orders, a copy of which is pinned on the Club House Notice Board. The entitled users for the Army controlled courts are: All British Army personnel and their families, British Army sponsored civilians who are employed or reside in the Garrison and their families, and Army personnel of the Nato Forces stationed at JHQ.

All RAF personnel, RAF sponsored civilians, and Air Force personnel of Nato Forces stationed in Rheindahlen and their families should use the RAF controlled courts. The 3 courts by the RAF Officers Mess are bookable through the Mess Reception, however there is no booking system for the 5 courts behind the RAF Sgts Mess.

Players are reminded that they must be in possession of their ID cards as checks of entitled players will be made.

Trainers with studs or ribbing, as used for cross country running, are NOT to be worn on the red shale courts as they damage the surface.

The Local Area

Schloß Rheydt - a 15th century moated Schloß situated just outside Rheydt, going north.

Schloß Dyck - a large moated castle, 12 kms east of Rheydt off B 230.

Schloß Wickrath - a moated castle situated in the centre of Wickrath.

Schwalmtal - All along the river Schwalm there are pretty walks and old mill houses converted into restaurants. About 8 kms from Rheindahlen on the way to Roermond, the river opens up into the Hariksee.

Mönchengladbach Münster - an 18th Century Münster set high on a hill on the way into Mönchengladbach town centre from JHQ.




Day Trips

Phantasialand - Located at Brühl, near Cologne, this is Germany's answer to Disneyland.






The Mosel - A trip down the Mosel to the famous wine growing districts is well worthwhile. Although the northern towns can be reached in a day, the southern Mosel would need to be visited over a weekend. At the confluence of the Rhine and Mosel stands Koblenz where, in 1216, the Teutonic Knights founded their first settlement and gave rise to the name Deutsches Eck. Further down is the mediaeval town of Cochem, a popular resort and wine tasting centre. Just behind it is the beautiful, fairy-tale castle, Burg Eltz (open Apr - 31 Oct).

The Romantic Road - The Romantic Road is a route which goes from Würzburg through Tauberbischofsheim, Rothenburg ob der Tauber, Augsburg and Schwangau to Füssen. It traverses beautiful countryside, many towns of great historical interest, wine producing areas and villages rich in folklore. By following this route, or part of it, the traveller would see some of the oldest and prettiest parts of Germany.



The Eifel - The Eifel is a hilly area west of the Rhine and South East of Aachen which forms part of the massif stretching across the frontier to the Ardennes. There are many pretty towns worth visiting in the area. Monschau is set in the Rur gorge, and crooked old half timbered houses cluster along the steep river bank; the mediaeval town of Bad Münstereifel has a history stretching back over 11 centuries and there are many well-preserved old buildings. Also in this area is the Rursee which offers many pleasant walks and boat trips. The famous Nürburgring race track is in the area formed by the triangle of the B 412, B 258 and B 257. When no races are being held you can pay to take your own car or motorbike round the course.



Trier - Porta Nigra



The Southern Mosel, Trier and Luxembourg

A trip down the Mosel could well culminate in a night's stay in Trier. Trier was founded by the Romans in 16 BC and became an important provincial capital and cultural centre. It is a fascinating town with architecture from all periods, including the famous Roman gateway 'Porta Nigra'. It is at the centre of the wine growing area which produces the famous Riesling wines. The vast cellars of the wine producers make an interesting visit. Trier makes a convenient base for a short tour into Luxembourg.

The Black Forest - The Black Forest or Schwarzwald is a very popular holiday area. This hilly region stretches out to the east of the Rhine and south of Karlsruhe. It offers lovely scenery, pleasant walks, good sporting facilities, including skiing in winter, and some fine towns. Particularly well-known is the mediaeval spa town of Baden-Baden with its famous casino.


The Harz Mountains - Germany's most northerly mountains, the Harz is another good area for walking and outdoor sports. Worth a visit is the town of Goslar with its old imperial palace and the spa town of Bad Harzburg.

N.B. A very useful booklet, "Happy Days in Germany", published by the German Tourist Authority can be obtained from the RAF Information Office.

Holland

Keukenhof - This is about 3 1/2 hours drive away and a visitor may prefer to include it in a weekend trip to Amsterdam. However, it is possible to make a day trip. Keukenhof is the national display garden of the Dutch bulb industry. It takes approximately 3 - 6 hours to see all the displays. The best time to go is at the end of April/beginning of May.

Arnhem - Famous as the site of the battle for the Rhine Bridge in World War II. The open air museum at Apeldoorn just outside Arnhem contains examples of architecture and craft from all parts of Holland. 5 kms to the west of Arnhem is the Airborne museum at Ossterbeck and on the same road is the Airborne cemetery. Also in the area are the Hage Veluwe National Park and the Burgers Zoo and Safari Park.



Amsterdam - More suited for a weekend visit, best seen by boat on one of the many canals which circle the heart of the city. Recommended sights: Queen's Palace, the Old Mint Tower, Diamond Factories and Portugese. Synagogue; north of the city, Volendam, Edam and Marhen give a glimpse of the "Old Holland" quaint villages with traditional dykes and decorated wooden houses; the locals wear native costume too.

Keukenhof

Maastricht - Oldest fortified town in Holland, founded in Roman days, with many mediaeval ramparts and gates, French bastions and well preserved town centre. Maastricht is a lovely shopping centre and there are boat trips which go to the nearby caves.

Overloon - Approximately 30 kms North East of Venlo, this is an open air museum set in the woods with all kinds of British, German and American weapons and also an indoor museum showing facets of war.

Beekse Bergen Safari Park - This Safari Park covers 120 acres and contains 600 wild animals - 70 species in their natural habitats. There is also a lake lined with a sandy beach and lots of attractions such as boat trips, pony rides, children's farm and so on

De Efteling - This is a marvellous place for young children with re-creations of well-loved fairy tales, such as Snow White, Sleeping Beauty, Red Riding Hood, etc. Included on the site are 2 fun fairs, an antique steam carousel, miniature steam railway, 2 water organs, swimming and rowing, the world's biggest swing boat and Python roller coaster which loops the loop four times.
